

POL 301 - International Organizations (45 contact hours, 3 credits)

Course Overview

The emphasis of this course will be conflict resolution and international political processes focusing upon interactions within the United Nations, its specialized agencies, and principal regional organizations, such as the European Union.

More specifically, the focus is on the philosophy and principles of International Organizations/IO. The first section tries to examine the rationale of IO by dealing with the origins, the nature, theory, history (the League of Nations) and methods of them. The second one is about global organizations and especially the United Nations (UN) system.

The third section will explore the regionalism and regional organizations with their specific institutions.

The last section of the course will be centered on the Model United Nations or European Union project. The goal is support students in improving their public speaking and argumentation skills while researching and formulating political positions based on the current events and the actual policies of the member country they represent.

Learning Outcomes

On completion of the course the students will be able to:

- ✓ Examine the role of international organizations in the global arena and at regional level
- ✓ Be familiar with the major events that shape international organizations and the global arena
- ✓ Discuss the major theoretical principles and concepts used to study international organizations
- ✓ Understand the various reasons why international organizations are formed and die or endure
- ✓ Develop critical thinking skills while analyzing global problems from various perspectives and the limits of the main international organizations
- ✓ Analyze issues from the selected member country's perspective, and articulate the foreign policy of the selected country (MUN/MEU)

Assignments and Grading

Further details on the assignments will be distributed during lectures and discussed. Opportunities for questions about the assignments will be given during the course. The grade for the course will be based on student's work as follows:



✓ Attendance & Participation (including assignments if any): 15%

✓ MUN/MEU Project: 40% (International Issue Oral Presentation 15% + Assigned Country Position Oral Presentation 10% + MUN Position Paper 15%)
