Course Description

Italian 102 will establish the foundations of conversation and grammar. Students will work on basic grammar and speaking skills through conversation, dialogues, exercises and drills; develop vocabulary through reading, discussing and writing; and learn more about Italian culture through reading, video and presentations

Note: the course is taught in Italian

Course Objectives / Learning Outcomes

The students can understand sentences and frequently used expressions related to areas of most immediate relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment); can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters; can describe in simple terms aspects of their background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.

- **LISTENING:** the students can understand phrases and the widest used vocabulary related to areas of immediate personal relevance (e. g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment). They can catch the main point in short, clear, simple messages and announcements.
- **READING:** the students can read very short, simple texts. They can find specific, predictable information in simple, everyday material such as advertisements, prospectuses, menus and timetables and they can understand short simple personal letters.
- **SPOKEN INTERACTION:** the students can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar topics and activities. They can handle very short social exchanges.
- **SPOKEN PRODUCTION:** the students can use a series of phrases and sentences to describe in simple terms his family and other people, living conditions, his educational background and his present or most recent job.
- **WRITING:** the students can write short, simple notes and messages relating to matters in areas of immediate need. They can write a very simple personal letter, for example thanking someone for something.

Grading

• Mid-term evaluation

The mid-term evaluation will be one cumulative exam (out of 100 points). The exam includes writing, grammar, vocabulary, listening, reading and speaking components.
