Course Description

WL 325 post-advanced aims to guide students to become aware of their personal learning style and strategies, and to support them in their independence. Students need to have completed 5 semesters of Italian language. The language acquisition process takes place and is reinforced through daily contact with the language and through an interactive computer component. The grammatical revision of the language emerges from the linguistic encounters in class, where language teaching is embedded in the socio-cultural context of contemporary Italy. The multimedia component reinforces, tests and contextualizes language learning done in the classroom and is regarded as an essential part of this course.

Course Objectives / Learning Outcomes

The students can understand with ease virtually everything heard or read; can summarize information from different spoken and written sources, re-constructing arguments and accounts in a coherent presentation; can express themself spontaneously, very fluently and precisely, differentiating finer shades of meaning even in more complex situations.

- **LISTENING:** the students have no difficulty understanding any kind of spoken language, whether live or broadcast, even when delivered at fast native speed, provided they have some time to get familiar with the accent.
- **READING:** the students can read with ease virtually all forms of the written language, including abstract, structurally or linguistically complex texts such as manuals, specialized articles and literary works.
- **SPOKEN INTERACTION:** the students can take part effortlessly in any conversation or discussion and have a good familiarity with idiomatic expressions and colloquialisms. They can express themself fluently and convey finer shades of meaning precisely. If they do have a problem they can backtrack and restructure around the difficulty so smoothly that other people are hardly aware of it.



- **SPOKEN PRODUCTION:** the students can present a clear, smooth-flowing description or argument in a style appropriate to the context and with an effective logical structure which helps the recipient to notice and remember significant points.
- **WRITING:** the students can write clear, smooth-flowing text in an appropriate style. They can write complex letters, reports or articles which present a case with an effective logical structure.
